URGENT – Tell Governor Healey: No Back Door Changes to Religious Discrimination Laws!

Last week, the Massachusetts Legislature sent the Governor its budget for FY 2025. Two measures unrelated to the budget were added, both addressing antisemitism while **ignoring the alarming rise of Islamophobia** in Massachusetts, as documented in our newly released 2024 mid-year report. Worse, these measures bypassed the usual law-making process, **shutting out public input**.

- Sec. 106: Requires the Dept. of Education to provide a curriculum on "antisemitism and societal bias;"
- Sec. 201: Creates a special commission to combat antisemitism and, among other things, recommends implementing the "United States national strategy" against antisemitism. This likely refers to the U.S. government's support for Israel and treating criticism of the war in Gaza as anti-Jewish discrimination which is misleading and dangerous.

WE NEED YOUR IMMEDIATE HELP! Gov. Healey has until Sunday, July 28, to either sign the budget as is or veto (reject) specific line items like these. CAIR-MA wrote to the Governor, but she needs to hear from voters, too.

"Hi, name is ______. I'm calling because I want the Governor to veto sections 106 and 201 of the budget bill. These two sections only address antisemitism and fail to protect all other religions. I believe that Massachusetts should protect the religious freedom of everyone, using an open and transparent process. Thank you."

Dear Gov. Healey: My name is _____ [first and last names] and I live in _____ [city/town]. I urge you to veto sections 106 and 201 of the budget, which focus on antisemitism. At a time when Islamophobia is at an all-time high in Massachusetts, any new laws should address <u>all</u> forms of religious and ethnic bias. They should also follow the standard legislative process, which allows for public comment. It's wrong to address only one form of religious discrimination and to bypass public participation.
